Discerning the Call to Evangelize Young Adults

n my experience, there are three keys to discernment: a relationship with God, a prayer life and an abandonment to God's will. My journey began when I was in second grade and people prayed with me for the gifts and charisms of the Spirit. For the first time in my life, I felt the presence and love of God. It was a realization that God is madly in love with me. It so touched me at the core that my heart felt full. Then, I started to speak in tongues. When I spoke in tongues, it was as if I was responding to God's love for me. Words can't express beauty beyond description and love beyond human love. From that moment, God became a part of my life and we journeyed together.

Then, my mother taught me how to read, meditate and pray with Scripture. Having a foundation of prayer and discipline to listen to him was instrumental. I had to get to know God and have a relationship with him before I started trusting him.

After college, I worked in "Corporate America" which is where God called me to evangelize young adults. Many of them move to a big city upon graduation for jobs. Most are achievement-oriented with a desire to climb the corporate ladder. In retrospect, I saw God's hands leading me into the corporate world where most young professionals work. Climbing that "ladder" entailed working many late nights to meet deadlines: I found my prayer life suffering because of working so much. I found that the higher I went up the ladder the more I experienced fleeting happiness and emptiness. There was much insecurity, materialism, and rest-lessness in maintaining a certain lifestyle and a "perfect girl" 🕏 image – beautiful, smart and fun.

In the corporate world, most young adults have stopped going to church. Many are consumed with working toward material success, yet the craving for meaning and purpose exists. However, they are not turning to God to fill the longing in their hearts: instead they turn to possessions, wealth, status and relationships. Their identity is not rooted in God but in their work, in their title and what the world says they should be. It's easy to believe the lies that a person has to be a certain way to be accepted, to be loved, and to be worthy in this world.

I saw a hunger that fame, glory or achievements

could never satisfy. Yet here I was with the answer to this real hunger and it's in the person of Jesus and the power of his Holy Spirit. So I turned to God in prayer and asked him to use me. Many times, God presents opportunities for us to share him with others but we are afraid to say anything.

Deep inside, I wanted to do God's will but was afraid of what others would say or think of me. I learned that I had to get out of the way so that God could bring me to a new level of freedom. It was a freedom from pleasing people and having to be perfect. Perfectionism brings only fear and anxiety. I realized that I had to move my focus from myself to others. I needed a mind shift so that I could be unafraid to be God's witness in the world. The more that I went out of my comfort zone, doing what God has called me to do and trusting in him, the more I began to gain confidence and became bold in sharing God's love and mercy. I was and continue to be inspired and empowered by St. Paul's words to the Corinthians when he said, "When I came to you, brothers, proclaiming the mystery of God, I did not come with sublimity of words of wisdom for I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. I came to you in weakness and fear and much trembling, and my message and my proclamation were not with persuasive words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of spirit and power so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God" (1 Cor 2:1-5).

Ethnic Diversity:

Meeting the Challenge of Unity

aint Paul wears many hats. One of his more common titles is "the Apostle of the Gentiles." Yet, the Charismatic Renewal has adopted him as "the Charismatic Apostle" especially, but not exclusively, for his teaching on the charisms—manifestations of the Holy Spirit—in 1

Does diversity entail division? Absolutely not.

Corinthians 12. Another title awarded to him is "the Apostle of Unity." The latter is of a particular importance to us this year as we are reflecting on unity, what it really entails, how it is

witnessed in the prayer groups and between the different ethnic groups.

Unity not Uniformity

The experience at the Duquesne retreat was at the genesis of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal. Because of that, there is a tendency to consider the American charismatic expression as normative. I still remember those explosive charismatic conferences at Notre Dame, Indiana three decades ago. The songs, the music, the prophetic words, the shouts of joy, the unfolding of the service, the manifestations of the Holy Spirit, and the whole ambiance were unique, and

so different from any spiritual gathering that I had ever attended thus far. Since it was a new phenomenon in the Catholic Church, that particular expression of the charismatic assembly was considered to be the point of reference for any other ethnic group that wanted to engage in the charismatic experience.

Back at our parishes we wanted to repeat that charismatic experience. But to us, there was only one expression of that experience: the Indiana one, as if the Holy Spirit had only one way of manifesting himself. We had forgotten for a while that the Holy Spirit was a creator not a manufacturer. We found ourselves busy trying to transfer the Indiana ambiance on Haitian soil. We were translating some songs and imitating some gestures and some wording of the prophetic messages.

However, slowly but surely, in the spirit of Vatican II which strongly insisted on enculturation in any evangelization effort, we started to allow the Spirit to utilize our resources in giving a distinctive Haitian flavor and expression to our charismatic gatherings. The Holy Spirit generated some

spiritual composers with words and rhythms that would touch the sensitive fibers of our souls. For instance, the "Kore Mwen" of Jean-Robert Themistocle, is a typical Haitian expression, difficult to translate into other languages and yet carrying for the Haitian people a moving connotation. The Holy Spirit has also inspired us to modify certain spiritual practices according to the specific needs of the Haitian people. For example, discerning the multiple elements of suffering in our history, socioeconomic struggles, education system, some cultural practices, the rapport between the government and the governed. We found it appropriate to have a whole service of healing and deliverance in the Seminars of the Life in the Spirit, before the effusion of the Holy Spirit.

If the Spirit has allowed us to express our charismatic spirituality differently, is he suggesting that each ethnic group should remain separated? In other words, does diversity entail division? Absolutely not. The Spirit who is infinitely creative wanted us to avoid confusing uniformity with unity. That all the ethnic groups express their charismatic spirituality in the same shape and form would be a demonstration of uniformity, not of unity. Saint Paul did not advocate uniformity but unity in diversity. We need to welcome diversity as a blessing instead of running away from it as a curse. "Diversity of gifts but the same Spirit. Diversity of service but the same Lord. Diversity of ministry but the same God (1 Cor 12:5-6). This understanding of unity in diversity is even stronger in verses 17-19 of the same chapter.

"If the whole body were an eye, where would be the hearing? If the whole were hearing, where would be the smelling? But now God has set the members, each one of them, in the body just as He pleased. And if they were all one member, where would the body be?"

After the listing of the charisms in verse 11, Paul comments: "But one and the same Spirit works all these things, distributing to each one individually as he wills." I think it is not farfetched at this point to consider each ethnic group as a gift to the others. With such a consideration, we can see Paul urging the different ethnic groups of the Renewal to help each other discern, discover and develop their own charisms in order to proclaim to all the nations the wondrous deeds of a God rich in diversity. This consideration is important if we don't want our different ethnic groups to fall into another harmful way: the cliques.

The Cliques

Allow me to go back to Paul and his first letter to the Corinthians. All of Paul's letters have been prompted as a response to problems faced by the communities that he founded. The Jesus-people of Corinth dispatched Chloe to Ephesus to seek Paul's advice on some issues that they were confronting. One of them was the formation of cliques. The cliques came from the Corinthians' misconception of baptism. All the people baptized by the same person formed a clique around that person as a leader and that practice was fracturing the Jesus-people community of Corinth. In his pastoral response to this issue, Paul reminded them what baptism does for them. Among other things, it makes them belong to Christ (1 Cor 3:21-23).

"No more boasting about following a particular human leader! For everything belongs to you, whether Paul or Apollos or Peter, or the world, or life and death, or the present and the future. Everything belongs to you, and you belong to Christ, and Christ belongs to God."

If we are not open to welcome, to discover and to encourage the different ways that the Spirit works in the other ethnic groups, our temptation to ethnocentrism is great. This practice is all the more pernicious in that it suggests the superiority of one ethnic group over the other. And that would be a very poor witnessing of the Spirit of love and unity. The allegiance to an ethnicity would be made at the expense of the allegiance to Christ. The above passage of Paul is very relevant to the Charismatic Renewal of the 21st Century. I hear in this passage an invitation to a Eucharistic renewal as well. We all belong to Christ. We are the body of Christ, and our cliques lead to a disintegration of that body instead of its edification. The Charismatic Renewal must pray more attentively and fervently this Eucharistic prayer:

"We thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you. May all of us who share in the body and blood of Christ be brought together in unity by the Holy Spirit" (Eucharistic Prayer II).

I'm sure we are all well aware that one of the greatest weaknesses in the Charismatic Renewal is the visible lack of unity we often find between our different groups and ministries. Where there is disunity and division the work of the Holy Spirit is undermined.

When Pope Francis addressed more than 50,000 Catholic charismatics at the Olympic Stadium in Rome on June 1st 2014, he gave us his six "expectations" of the world-wide Renewal. His final expectation was this:

"Seek unity in the Renewal because unity comes from the Holy Spirit and is born of the unity of the Trinity. From whom does division come? From the Devil! Division comes from the Devil. Flee from internal fights please! They must not exist among us!"

These are powerful words from the Holy Father who clearly sees division of any sort as a work of the Devil which must be consciously and deliberately resisted, and we do well to remember

that these are also the words of someone who loves the Renewal and who knows us well. He sees what happens when there is division among us, and how it undermines the life-changing work of baptism in the Holy Spirit. Most of us know he is absolutely right because we too have seen for ourselves the results of division and negative attitudes. We may even on occasions have contributed to the problem.

Charismatic Renewal has something essential and very powerful to give to the Church, baptism in the Holy Spirit, and has produced a rich harvest of visible fruit—prayer groups, many different kinds of communities, organizations promoting and training people for the new evangelization, special ministries, houses of prayer and formation, and much more. The list is impressive. The Lord has given the vision

for each of these to individual men and women, but it's important to remember that all are inspired and empowered by the same Holy Spirit and have been established to extend the same

in doctrine, abundantly gifted by God but lacking in love, then we have failed. Love lies at the heart of all our relationships. It's easy to maintain a loving relationship at arm's length—to

meet on a rather superficial and trivial level.


Kingdom. While each of us has a clear responsibility to be faithful to our Godgiven vision, we must never become critical of what others are doing just because it's different. There's no place in God's plan for narrow-minded people or for personal empire builders. The vision he's given us recognizes our individuality but requires us to co-operate with others. This means we have to invest time and energy in building positive relationships with those in the Renewal who may not share our particular vision.

But when we get close and involved with each other we soon discover how good our relationships really are. We will often find it difficult to relate to certain people, and this is where we need to turn to God for help.

There are four key values which must be present in every relationship: Trust, Respect, Understanding, Love. Of these, Trust is the most fragile. It's both a decision and a process; it depends on character and demands honesty rather than perfection. Respect means we recognize someone's dignity, value and worth; it's all about who they are, not about what they do, and it calls for concrete expressions of encouragement and affirmation. Understanding does not mean agreement, but when someone knows I understand them it releases them from the on-going need to justify their beliefs and actions. Finally Love—a greatly overused word which in this context is simply a decision we make and to which we remain faithful no matter what may happen.

Why am I pushing this point? Because good relationships are the key to avoiding disunity in the Renewal but they demand our time, effort and commitment, often for little obvious personal gain. They may be very costly, but they're essential. I need to work out my particular God-given vision alongside all the others in the Renewal. There's nothing new about this, even though I often meet people who think that anyone who doesn't share their particular vision must be wrong. But the Lord has always given many different visions; just look at the rich variety of the religious orders. "The parts are many but the body is one" (1 Cor 12:20). We all share in the common mission to live the Gospel and to make disciples of all the nations. If I do my part and encourage other people to do theirs, the Renewal will be much more effective, but all our efforts are undermined when there are internal fights, as we know to our shame.

Our claims to be filled with the Spirit are meaningless if our attitudes and behavior do not show love. Love bears all things, believes the best and holds on even when people let me down again and again (1 Cor 13). If we are perfect So let's be supportive, encouraging and speak well of the many other groups, organizations and movements in the Church and particularly of those in the Renewal who are called to a huge variety of ministries and areas of service. Let's invest time and effort in keeping our relationships strong, our love flow-




ing, and commit ourselves to praying for one another. Then we'll see even more fruit and the Kingdom of God will be extended on many fronts. We need to see things as God sees them and to work side by side with those who have different visions and callings to achieve together his divine purposes. So much more is possible when we enjoy good relationships. As Pope Francis exhorted us, "Flee from internal fights please! They must not exist among us!"



Time to get dressed

was in a car yesterday, driving through Rome with a group of friends. My assignment was to check out places to hold a future event in the city. As we drove along, we passed by so many places that had such dear memories for me: St Peter's Basilica where we met with Pope Paul VI at Pentecost 1975, the fields above the catacombs of St. Callistus where we gathered to praise God and celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit which at times would break out into spontaneous dancing!

I saw places where men and women from around the world had gathered, speaking different languages but united in the language of the Spirit. Oh the joy, the fire...and the fun!

My thoughts were brought back to the present moment when an Argentinian woman (a personal friend of Pope Francis) asked me a question as we drove along. "In June, it will be a year since the Holy Father addressed the worldwide Renewal here in Rome. At that time he told us he wanted us to bring this experience of the Holy Spirit to all of the Church. I haven't seen much action in the Renewal on this point. Jim, if the Holy Father should ask me how we are doing what shall I tell him?"

"Tell him we got tired," I mumbled under my breath. The conversation in the car stopped and everyone looked at me. "Some folks have been trying to do that very thing for the last 50 years," I continued, "and have not always been welcomed with open arms. I think some people have just worn down." The Argentine nodded in silent agreement but came back with a dramatic statement "But

now there is a new opportunity, a new possibility! We have to wake the Renewal up! This is the time!" Another added in, "We have carried this baby for so long, we cannot be too tired to deliver the child!" Another analogy was offered; "It is as if we got dressed to go to a party and we waited and waited for the invitation. We got tired of waiting so we took off our party clothes and put on our pajamas. Now the party is about to begin...and we are in our pajamas!"

We were driving by St Peter's at the moment and my thoughts turned to a particular place in the square where once I had seen an ailing Pope John Paul II struggle out of his chair to declare with all the strength he could muster, "Be open to the Holy Spirit! Be open to the Holy Spirit!" Those words, spoken many years earlier, seemed to me to be a prophetic exhortation from the now-canonized Pontiff.

Are we truly "open to the Holy Spirit?" Are we indeed at a moment of "new opportunity, new possibility?" Are we "dressed for the party" or "home in our pajamas?"

The conversation in the car returned to normal, but I sat there in silence, looking out the window and reflecting on the last 5 minutes.....and the last 50 years.

I will acknowledge that time has moved on and we cannot return to 1967. Nor can we discern the future through a nostalgic look at the past. nostalgic look at the past.

We can learn from the past, however, and see what we can embrace in the current moment and go forward.

I know I am speaking in broad generalities, but here are some things we did that kept the fire burning bright:

We were people committed to prayer. Our lives were restructured to ensure that we had a significant amount of time for personal prayer. It became one of the highest priorities of life...higher than sleep or showers or food. It was a common thing to ask a friend "So...how is your prayer time going these days?" Our prayer was contemplative, it was charismatic, it was traditional...and it was consistent. Every follower of Jesus saw it as their personal responsibility to have a daily prayer time.

We devoured Scripture. When touched by the Holy Spirit, we became infatuated with the Word of God. We would always carry our Bibles with us. A Scripture passage could become the focus of a lunch time conversation. We would constantly turn to Scripture for strength, guidance and inspiration. It was unthinkable to go to bed at night if you had not read your Bible for whatever amount of time you were committed.

After encountering the Holy Spirit, we had such a new sensitivity to the Sacraments! We were amazed that ancient rituals which we had grown up with now seemed so vital and alive. Every time we went to Mass, every time we entered the confessional, we expected to encounter the living Christ who had become so real, so relevant in our lives.

The Spirit of God also opened our hearts to others. We hungered for fellowship. We met with brothers and sisters of other denominations and saw them as co-workers in the Vineyard. Our own fellow Catholics became deepest friends. God put a new love in our hearts for family and co-workers. It was a sovereign work of God, and we knew it. We never complained about a prayer meeting going too long. Heck, we would stay up all night if need be...it was just so much fun to be together!

We did not "throw a switch" after a prayer meeting. We sought to follow the Spirit 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We would use the charisms at a conference, but also in the workplace. God "might show up anywhere" and we always wanted to be ready to follow his lead.

I think that even though we saw ourselves as "part of the Renewal," our true identity was that we had been grasped by Christ. Our identity was directly linked to him. There was not much talk about my ministry or one person's accomplishments. The focus was on God, not the person.

And it was about the Lord that we spoke so freely. We could not be quiet! We would

tell anybody...and everybody that "We have seen the Lord!" Sometimes we were met with skepticism and even mocking...but we would not be silent. What had been whispered to us in our hearts was shouted from the rooftops!

There was a sense that we were all in this together. True, the Renewal had leaders, but it had no spectators.

Editor's Note: In response to the Holy Father's words at the Italian Renewal's 37th National Convocation where he was asked to tell the Renewal what the Pope expects from us, the Editorial Board of Pentecost Today decided to reflect on several points made by Pope Francis. The following reflection is the fourth.

Touch Jesus

Be close to the poor and to those in need, so as to touch in their flesh the wounded flesh of Jesus. Please draw near to them (Pope Francis).

"The spirit of the Lord is upon me; therefore he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor!" (Lk 4:18). This is every Christian's job description. Jesus wants us to understand that what he said is true, that the spirit of the Lord is upon me. He was talking about himself but later on he tells us that he will give us the same spirit so that we will be able to carry out his mission in the world. (See Jn 16:4-7, 13-14). All who believe in him and follow him are to be anointed by the Holy Spirit.

"You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes down upon you" (Acts 1:8). The word power translated from the Greek means ability, efficiency and might. When we are baptized in the Holy Spirit we are fully equipped to draw near to the poor and to bring them the Good News of God's love in Jesus Christ. The gifts of the Holy Spirit are Jesus' love flowing through us to touch the wounded flesh of Christ. Disciples of Jesus are God's chosen instruments to bring hope to the hurting world and to deliver justice to the poor and oppressed. All of our service must be led by the Holy Spirit (Eph 2:10) so that our works will bear fruit. We can pray, "Holy Spirit lead me to the person you want me to bless."

I visited Tomas and his wife in their humble shack and invited them to the prayer meeting in the hills of Juarez, Mexico. Tomas came and I noticed that he always carried a small empty bucket. The thought came to me, "Put a chicken in his bucket. "I did ... I continued for several weeks. Many years ago I heard these words in my heart "Alman I." Jesus with the food." We presented the Good News in the



meeting: "Jesus died for you so that you many have forgiveness of your sins, receive a new life on this earth, and receive a new life for all eternity." Many accept this gift of salvation each week and experience joy, freedom, and God's love filling them. The poor gladly receive the Good News. Tomas had no response. Finally, the week of Christmas, with tears, he surrendered his life to Jesus and received the Holy Spirit. Just three months later he died. His wife said that he was a changed man.

We cannot preach good news and be bad news. Yes, we must meet physical needs, but we must do more. We must bring the Gospel to the poor (Rom 1:16). The Gospel is the power of God!

Juanita, a widow, came to the prayer meeting because she was sick. She could not afford a doctor. She lived in a tent and had little food. She was filled with joy to hear that Jesus still heals today and wants to touch her. We prayed with Juanita and she was set free from sickness and depression. She gratefully received the Holy Spirit. We built her a small house. All four of her children became zealous followers of Jesus and turned from a life of prostitution and vice.

The poor are also the rich who don't know Jesus—those who have enough of this world's goods but don't know the reality of what Jesus did for us by dying on the cross.

ark was a successful business man. He was brought to his knees when his wife left him because of his uncontrollable temper and lustful lifestyle. No one had ever presented the Good News of Jesus to him. He gladly repented of his sins and was freed from despair. He went to confession and returned to the sacraments. He is now preaching the Gospel in South America. He first shared with his family and friends.

We can touch Jesus if we are willing to go to the poor—Draw near! (Matt 28:19).

We go to the children in the hills who have no food. We feed them and teach them about Jesus. We go to the unemployed and help them get jobs and teach them about Jesus. We go to the forgotten elderly and bless them with medicine, food, and clothes and teach them about Jesus' love. We go to the widow and to those who live in shacks. We have been able to build small homes and provide help as we teach them about Jesus. We go to the dying and pray with them to receive the gift of eternal life.

When we receive the Holy Spirit we have the ability of the Holy Spirit to do what is impossible for us to do by our own efforts. Faithful listening to the Holy Spirit's guiding us will always lead us to draw near to the poor and touch in their flesh the wounded flesh of Iesus. Please draw near to them.

Everyone did their part. Everyone took personal responsibility, doing their share to keep the fires of Pentecost burning bright.

The driver of the car slammed on the brakes to avoid hitting a motorcycle, jarring me out of my reverie. I tried to re-enter the conversation but could not. I was asking myself a few questions:

What is my daily prayer life like? How committed am I each day to Scripture? Do I have an expectation of encountering the living Lord in the sacraments...or am I just going through the motions? Am I still in fellowship, on a regular basis with "people of the fire?" Am I "charismatic" only when it is convenient or am I always ready to respond to the promptings of the Spirit? Who have I

spoken with recently about my encounter with Christ? Do I see myself as belonging to a religious club...or to Christ? Is my involvement in Charismatic Renewal more about what God is doing...or what I am doing? Am I taking some responsibility for fanning the flame in my own life, or waiting for others to carry me along? Can I just relax, have a little more fun and trust in God or do I need to "make everything work?" Where is the fire? Where is the joy? Where is my "first love?"

I hadn't noticed that the car was parked and everyone had gotten out. We were going to the Church of the Holy Spirit, very close to St Peter's. I hurriedly walked in with a new enthusiasm. This is a new moment, a new opportunity! The best days lie ahead. We only need



This ecumenical Christian community will provide us with a unique experience in ecumenical unity and the love of the Lord in a different venue. Strengthening Families

hen the email came last October asking the NSC to collaborate with the leader of the Italian Renewal (Rinnovamento Nello Spirito Santo), who is also the President of the Vatican Foundation called the International Center Family of Nazareth, on a charismatic event within the World Meeting of Families, it was as if the Lord was knocking at the door (see Rev 3:20) of the Renewal in the U.S. Why? To give us a great opportunity to serve him and to proclaim "the Lordship of Jesus Christ and the love of the Father in the power of the Holy Spirit which leads to the renewal of the grace and culture of Pentecost" (NSC Mission Statement), and to strengthen the family (when the very concepts of marriage as between one man and one woman, and of the family needing both a mother and a father, are under incredible assault).

We said "yes" without hesitation, drawing into the collaboration the local Renewal in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, the Association of Diocesan Liaisons, the leadership of the Haitian, Hispanic and Filipino Renewal in the U.S., and the Catholic Fraternity of Charismatic Communities and Fellowships. Also collaborating is the International Catholic Charismatic Renewal Service in the Vatican.

As you may know, the World Meeting of Families will be held September 22-27 in Philadelphia with our Holy Father attending on the weekend: first at a Festival of Families, Saturday evening September 26, and then celebrating Mass on Sunday afternoon, September 27—both of these events will be held on the Ben Franklin Parkway. Organizers are expecting 2 million people for the weekend events.

Our charismatic event will be held Saturday morning from 8:30 AM-1:30 PM. We have called it a Gathering of the Renewal for a New Evangelization of the Family. Our theme is "The family is alive in the power of the Spirit." Speakers include Michelle Moran (ICCRS), Salvatore Martinez, and Msgr. Joe Malagreca. We will have praise and worship throughout, concluding with Mass. Cardinal Peter Turkson from Ghana, President of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace, will be the principal celebrant and homilist. A number of other Cardinals and Bishops are expected to attend and concelebrate.

There will be a small fee to attend. The location is a short distance to the Parkway where the Festival of Families will be held. Details are being finalized and will be on our website soon. (See ad page 11 this issue.)

In this Year of Unity, what better way to show forth the unity in the Renewal in the U.S. than to come together with brothers and sisters from the Renewal in Central and South America, Canada, Europe, and perhaps many other places as well to give witness to the importance of family. To be together with Pope Francis here in the U.S. will be a "joyful moment for millions of Catholics and people of good will...to inspire our families in the mission of love" (Archbishop Joseph Kurtz).

After the knock, Jesus says, "I will come in to share a meal at that person's side... Let anyone who can hear, listen to what the Spirit is saying to the Churches" (Rev 3:20, 22). •

What we have seen and heard

Today's anointing of the Spirit

"Have you had a personal experience of Pentecost?"

his was the question that Fr. Jim Ferry asked me 46 years ago. It led me to pray to be baptized in the Holy Spirit, changed my life and gave me a new ministry. I left teaching about World History and began traveling the world to teach about Jesus and the Holy Spirit to the glory of the Father.

What I have seen and heard speaking at conferences in over 60 countries is that when we come to God with expectant faith asking for a new Pentecost, he hears our prayer and pours out his Holy Spirit and the charisms in great abundance.

However, I've also experienced a tendency to focus on praying for healing and neglecting to continue to lead people in prayer to be baptized in the Spirit. At the first Pentecost the crowd asked Peter, "What do we have to do to receive this Holy Spirit?" St. Peter's answer, "Repent, accept Jesus as Lord and you will receive the Holy Spirit"

(Acts 2:38) frames the way I learned to pray with people to be baptized in the Holy Spirit.

In our healing services we experience many signs and wonders (resting in the Spirit, healings, etc.) and these are wonderful manifestations of God's love. However, leaders of such services should work to encourage repentance and a desire to be baptized in the Holy Spirit among the participants. Baptism in the Holy Spirit is so much more than healing or resting in the Spirit. It is "a life-transforming experience of the love of God the Father poured into one's heart by the Holy Spirit, received through a surrender to the Lordship of Jesus Christ... and equips a person with charisms for service and mission" (ICCRS, Baptism in the Holy Spirit, p 13).

We have taught effectively about God's healing love but I've experienced a need to teach our people about the purifying fire, about embracing the cross, about finding God in the valleys and desert in our prayer and our life.

The call of the Church to a new evangelization is one the Charismatic Renewal has heard from the Holy Spirit and has responded to generously for many years. Our Holy Father recognized this recently when he said, "The Charismatic Renewal is a great force at the service of the proclamation of the Gospel, in the joy of the Holy Spirit." The challenge now, as leaders age, is to pass on the responsibility and the work of service to younger leaders and for those younger leaders to, in turn, raise up new leaders. We need to move on to today's anointing of the Spirit for us and leave yesterday's anointing to those new people whom God is raising up...and I believe that in this way we will all experience a new Pentecost! •


